



GOSPEL REFLECTION FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Loving isn't too difficult, right? Many of us are surrounded by kind, lovely people trying to do the right thing. Indeed, to "love? your neighbor as yourself" seems like it should be easy enough. Treat people like you would like to be treated. Bring the new neighbors some baked goods (normal and gluten-free, just in case). Chat with the bank teller about his holiday weekend. Write an occasional card to your sister "just because." There were probably varieties of these acts of kindness in Jesus' day. Perhaps substituting figs for cookies. But "exchange pleasantries with the traveling cloth merchant" isn't the example Jesus gives.

"A man fell victim to robbers... they stripped him and beat him and went off leaving him half-dead." The righteous pass by the scene of the dying man. The hero of the story is the one on the margins of Jewish society, who perhaps would not have been welcomed, in other circumstances, by the man now in the ditch. His neighborly love causes him to halt his journey, to tend wounds, and to pay for the man's care out of his own savings. Are we interruptible? Are we attentive to the hurts of others? Are we generous with our money and possessions?

In the past few weeks, who has crossed your mind as someone in need of help? Perhaps it's an acquaintance suffering from cancer. Maybe you were invited to donate or volunteer to a local social cause, but it just won't stick in your mind (or schedule) to make it happen. The needs of people are many and varied. We can't help everyone, but God does place opportunities in our path for compassion and courageous love. This week, be "the one who treated him with mercy."

We have heard the story of the Good Samaritan so many times. Have we ever realized that it is an enemy and outcast who is the hero of the story? Freed from laws that limit acts of mercy and compassion, the Samaritan becomes the example of how to love God by loving our neighbor. Our minds know what our faith teaches, and our mouths know what words to speak. Ultimately, deep down in our conscience, we know how we ought to act. Yet, as we encounter each new day, do we always do what we are called to do? Our neighbors live next to us and far away. They are down the street, sitting beside us, living in Mexico, Honduras, Ecuador, Guatemala, Poland, Russia, China, Korea, and Iraq. Our neighbors are even found in people who want to hurt us. How do we love them as Jesus asks us to? How we answer this question will determine how much we really love God.

Did you know...that Jesus says everyone is now our neighbor? When the scholar asked

Jesus who is his neighbor, Jesus told him the story of the Good Samaritan. Robbers had hurt a man, and stole his belongings. Two Jewish men passed him by, without helping him. We don't know why they didn't stop maybe they were afraid of getting



mugged themselves. However, Jewish law states that they should have stopped and helped him. Both being priests, they knew the law. But they protected themselves first.

It was a Samaritan man—from the area I spoke of two weeks ago—that took a risk and checked on the man. When he saw that the hurt man was still alive, he brought him to an inn, cleaned up his wounds, and paid for his care until he was fully recovered. The Samaritan was merciful to someone who was not a member of his family, nor a member of his community. He showed mercy to someone who belonged to a group who considered him to be unworthy, and unclean. The Good Samaritan did not let the feelings of another prevent him for showing love.

Message from the Vatican about Celebrating a Season of Creation September 1st - October 4th

"I now establish my covenant with you and with your descendants after you and with every living creature ... On Earth." (Genesis 9:9-10)

We are part of a single, wondrously complex web of life that is woven by God. Each year from September 1 to October 4, the Christian family celebrates the good gift of creation. This global celebration began in 1989 with the Ecumenical

Patriarchate's recognition of the day of prayer for creation and is now embraced by the wide ecumenical community.

During the Season of Creation, we unite as one family in Christ, celebrating the bonds we share with each other and with "every living creature on Earth" (Genesis 9:10). The Christian family celebrates the Season by spending time in prayer, considering ways to inhabit our common home more sustainably, and lifting our voices in the public sphere.

This Season of Creation, we offer our reflections on the web of life itself, in the hope that they might provoke richer contemplation and deeper responses among us, brothers and sisters. We do it in ecumenical spirit and in acknowledging that Creation is given as a gift to all of us and that we are called to shared responsibility for its protection. The scriptures begin with God's affirmation that all of creation is "very good," and as the stewards of God's creation, we are called to protect and nurture its goodness (Genesis 1:30, Genesis 1:28, Jeremiah 29:5-7), Every species, indeed all creation, is precious because it is made by God. All reflect an aspect of God. "How many are your works, Lord! In wisdom you made them all; the Earth is full of your creatures" (Psalm 104:24). This is why we lament that God's creatures are disappearing from the Earth at a rate we can scarcely comprehend. From humble insects to majestic mammals, from microscopic plankton to towering trees, plants and creatures from across God's dominion are becoming extinct, and may never be seen again.

We encourage the whole Christian family to join us in this special time to pray, reflect, and take bold action to preserve creation in all its complexity and specificity. This year in particular will bring the opportunity to lift a united voice on such occasions as the World Conservation Congress in June, the UN climate summit in September, the Catholic synod on the Amazon in October, and the UN climate change conference in November.

A Special invitation from the Vatican to join the **Season of Creation**......

From September to October each year, Christian communities, since 1981 have been celebrating the **Season of Creation** by praying and acting together to protect our common home. The season is celebrated by tens of thousands of Christians around the world annually.

The **Season of Creation** begins on September 1, the World Day of Prayer for Creation and ends on the feast of St Francis October 4th. The theme of this year's **Season of Creation** celebration is "the web of life."

We Catholics at St Julia's are uniting with others in the Christian family to protect every creature in God's beautifully complex web of creation. Protecting creation in all its glory coincides with another special event this year. In October, just after the **Season of Creation** closes, bishops from around the world will join His Holiness for a synod on the Amazon, an occasion for prayerful reflection on how we protect the Amazon and the people who share it.

The **Season of Creation** is an opportunity to celebrate the abundance of life and protect the light inside each member of God's creation. While many of our parishioners are away during the summer months (hopefully spending lots of time outside) we will be planning through ongoing prayer, changes in lifestyle, and ad-



vocacy ways in which we can live out our faith to care for creation.
