



GOSPEL REFLECTION SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Active and contemplative. At work and at rest. These are dynamics we all face in our lives, and if we're honest, we might not always balance perfectly! In this Sunday's Gospel, our daily tensions play out in two sisters. Mary "sat beside the Lord at his feet listening to him speak." Martha, on the other hand, is "burdened with much serving." This, as it turns out, is not necessarily "the better part."

All of us reading this have some sort of labor we engage in. We have different trades or careers. We have responsibilities as family members, some of which may take up most of our time. In the time of Scripture, showing hospitality to guests was one of the most important values in society. Our work is important. Jesus himself spent decades as a carpenter. So what's the problem with Martha? Martha is burdened, anxious, and worried. Not only that, but she resents her sister's choice. "Tell her to help me," she demands of Jesus.

How easy it is to get very busy doing good things. We need to provide for our families and plan for retirement. We need to make sure children are clothed, fed, and educated. Our committees, ministries, and sports schedules need to stay on track. However, without a balance of work with rest, without contemplation in the midst of our action, we will miss the point. While many parts are required for our life in the world to function, the better part is our relationship with God. This week, make time in your busy schedule to sit at Jesus' feet. Maybe this is 20 minutes with Scripture, participating in a daily Mass, or a quiet walk alone in the park. Receive what Christ wants to speak to you.

LIVE THE LITURGY

We all have a tremendous amount of responsibility. Every day presents more challenges and lists of things we need to accomplish. Life, however, is more than just to do lists. Life is more about who we are and how present we are to what is happening around us. Our relationship with God is the same. It is not just about doing the right things or showing up in the right places, even though these are certainly important. What is more important is the quality of our presence in God's presence. How attentive are we to His revelations of presence to us? If life's demands, however noble they be, overly consume us, we will miss being surprised by God's presence: in creation, in sacrament, in our brothers and sisters, and in ourselves. Listen carefully to Martha and Mary's story today.

GRADES 1-6

Did you know...that Jesus often visited his friends named Martha, Mary and Lazarus, who were a brother and two sisters living in the village of Bethany? Bethany is about 1 1/2 miles from Jerusalem, so whenever Jesus was in Jerusalem, he would visit with his friends. We don't know exactly where the house is, although there is a Church there named after Lazarus. It is right nearby the traditional site of the tomb of Lazarus. Lazarus is the man Jesus raised from the dead. Tradition is that Lazarus lived to be a very old man—spending the rest of his life teaching others about Jesus.

In today's Gospel, we hear Martha complaining that she is doing all the cooking and cleaning, while Mary is just sitting and listening to Jesus talk about God. Martha probably expected Jesus to tell Mary to help her, but in-



stead Jesus' answer meant that it is more important to put God first, than everyday tasks! We are to put God first as well, acting the way God wants us to, rather than what we or others want us to.

What does God want you to do, right now?

Local Catholics as well parish representatives across the nation are working to protect what matters for people today and for future generations. Efforts are based on understanding that burning fossil fuels is a major cause of increasing risks to our health and wellbeing. The carbon dioxide released into the atmosphere acts like a heat -trapping blanket and this effect causes the world ocean to warm which increases evaporation leading to more water in the atmosphere.

"Laudato Si' in the American Catholic Church," a recent conference co-sponsored by the Catholic Climate Covenant and Creighton University aimed to integrate *Laudato Si'* and its messages on creation care more deeply into the daily experience of Catholics in America.



Attendees from across the country spanned a range of ministries,

backgrounds, and ages, with a sizeable number of young Catholics. Among them were scientists, energy experts, environmental leaders, campus ministers, activists, liturgists, clergy and religious, and staff from several state Catholic conferences. along with the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, three bishops and a representative from the Vatican. Fran Ludwig, Chair of the Boston Chapter of the Global Catholic Climate Movement (BCCM) attended and participated in the "Care for Creation Teams" track. "Our parishes and schools must become centers of truth-telling about the threats to God's creation, which are indisputably rising in our world," San Diego Bishop Robert McElroy said. "For us in the United States at this perilous moment in our national history, the core themes of Laudato Si' are especially urgent. "



Educational support for St Vincent de Paul clients.....a result of the generosity of Lincoln and Weston parishioners and residents.

Our Lincoln/Weston St. Vincent de Paul Conference provides scholarships and financial assistance for education expenses to Lincoln and Weston individuals who qualify. (We recently received a \$10,000. Codman Family Trust grant to assist Lincoln clients!) Often these clients are already working, and struggling to pull together resources to pay for additional schooling. Recent examples include: funds for a client studying to become a sonogram technician, funding for a program to become a licensed and certified mediator, and money for books for Lincoln and Weston students who are receiving financial aid, have part-time jobs, and still struggle to meet school expenses. We already have clients who "graduated" from our pantry as a result of gaining better paying jobs! We are excited to be able to use SVdP and Codman grant funds to carry out a St Vincent de Paul nation-wide goal: work to end the systemic causes that lead to poverty.
