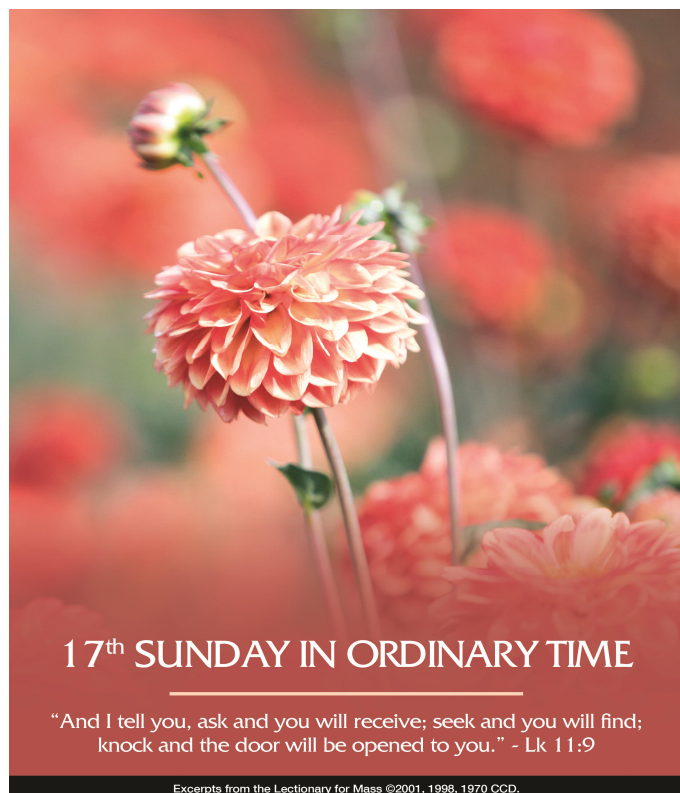

GOSPEL REFLECTION SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Are you guilty of spiritual stockpiling? Spiritual stockpiling isn't an endless rotation of rosaries and novenas. It's accumulating emotional "goods" to meet your needs. Perhaps it's a collection of material objects you treasure. Maybe it's a preoccupation with money. It could also be relationships, making sure there's always enough friends and connections to never really feel alone. It's our tendency to let things add up so that we won't quite need God to fulfill our inner life. Yet in this Sunday's Gospel, we have that inescapable petition from the Our Father. "Give us each day our daily bread."

This life isn't an immediate arrival. And as much as we might try to shore up possessions and pleasures, we know the journey is unpredictable. Give us this day our daily bread implies enough for the next set of steps, but not enough to stockpile. So here's the big question: Do we trust God to give us what we need? After all, "What father among you would hand his son a snake when he asks for a fish?... how much more will the Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him?" At the Last Supper, Jesus said he would never leave us orphaned. God will not abandon us. And surely He wouldn't ask us to pray for what He does not intend to give.

Of course, sometimes our prayers for daily help can seem to go unanswered. Today's Gospel has advice for that, too. "I tell you... he will give up to him whatever he needs because of his persistence." Our spiritual stockpiling increases our self-reliance and decreases our openness to God's possibilities. Be persistent in your pursuit of God! Trust that He will keep His promises to provide for us, today and always.

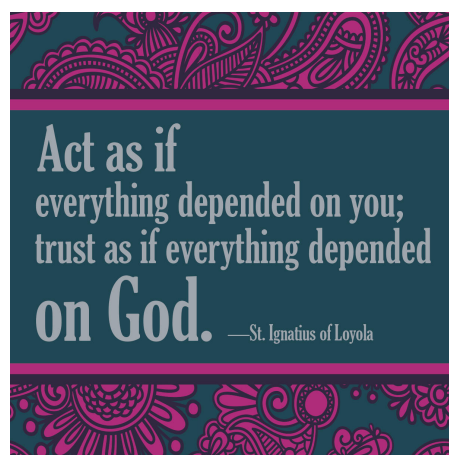
LIVE THE LITURGY

St Julia's parishioners have been generous in the past supporting Catholic Charities and refugee families. Lincoln resident Deb Palmer recently reported on her trip to the Catholic Charities Humanitarian Respite Center on our southern border and this is her description of just one day at this Catholic Charities site at McAllen TX:

Yesterday morning after helping get lunch started, I went to the coloring station. I drew and colored with kids who had just been released from the ICE facility. So many kids - they kept coming in by the busload with their parents all day long. A couple toddlers sat on my lap, three year olds sat in chairs too big for them, ten year olds helped with little ones they had never met. They sat with me while their parents stood in lines (sometimes lines 100 deep) to get basic supplies like toothbrushes and shoelaces and soap and water, and to get bus tickets or plane tickets and contact their sponsors and relatives all over the country. Some kids didn't want to stay at the coloring station - they stayed clinging to their parents in the lines. But plenty came over with a smile to ask for a "página y colores y un lugar para sentarse". The kids were excited - excited because they knew they were finally on their way to New Orleans, to Dallas, to New York, to Denver. Kids who had no shoes or no hair ties, who hadn't showered in 6 days or more.

I got super tired after a bunch of hours with so many kids. So in the late afternoon I went to help out at the health station, where I took the temperatures of so many people, gave out so much honey cough syrup and tylenol and vicks (Vicks Vapor Rub, the cure-all for everything - thank goodness for Vicks). I gave out diapers and menstrual pads and chapstick, toilet paper and kleenex, shoelaces and fingernail clippers. We escorted a few of the worst cases upstairs to the health clinic for quarantine and medical evaluation. By 7:30pm, after over ten hours of constant interactions with people with real and basic health and human needs, when we were finally leaving to go find ourselves some dinner, the dinner line at the Center (which they began serving at 6) had snaked all around the inside of this large building, past our health counter which is clear on the other side from the comedor. And the line kept growing. They were clearing away the tables and chairs so they could lay out mats for sleeping. I was trying to imagine how this many people could get through the line, could fit on this floor lying down... I was glad at least some would be heading to their destinations before bedtime.

Educational support for St Vincent de Paul clients.....a result of the generosity of Lincoln and Weston parishioners and residents.

Our Lincoln/Weston St. Vincent de Paul Conference provides scholarships and financial assistance for education expenses to Lincoln and Weston individuals who qualify. (We recently received a \$10,000. Codman Family Trust grant to assist Lincoln clients!) Often these clients are already working, and struggling to pull together resources to pay for additional schooling. Recent examples include: funds for a client studying to become a sonogram technician, funding for a program to become a licensed and certified mediator, and money for books for Lincoln and Weston students who are receiving financial aid, have part-time jobs, and still struggle to meet school expenses. We already have clients who “graduated” from our pantry as a result of gaining better paying jobs! We are excited to be able to use SVdP and Codman grant funds to carry out a St Vincent de Paul nation-wide goal: work to end the systemic causes that lead to poverty.
