



GOSPEL REFLECTION TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"Ten lepers met him. They stood at a distance ..." In the ancient world and into the Middle Ages, there was no treatment for leprosy. People thought it was wildly contagious and were suspicious of any skin diseases. Lepers were isolated from civil society. This isolation was uphold by the Mosaic Law. Should there be a healing from leprosy, the former leper was to present himself to a priest to certify the healing. Like Jesus commands, "Show yourselves to the priests." The person would then undergo a religious rite to be formally reintroduced to society. In other words, a leper got their life back. So why didn't they come back?

"As they were going they were cleansed. And one of them, realizing he had been healed, returned, glorifying God in a loud voice; and he fell at the feet of Jesus and thanked him." Of the ten lepers healed by Christ, only one returns with a grateful heart. The others, perhaps, were thankful enough. Perhaps they couldn't believe their luck, and they hastened to the priests to confirm the healing. They were more than willing to leave their life of rejection and isolation behind. Why take any steps backward, when the way ahead was so attractive? An attitude like this is perhaps understandable, but few would admire it.

How about you? Do you come back? If you've ever had the experience of getting what you hoped and prayed for, you know that this can sometimes be easier said than done. When we've wanted something badly enough, how easy it can be to focus on the gift rather than the giver. The truth is, God is daily offering us gifts: the gift of our existence, of the created world, of family and friends, of modern conveniences. Even in times of distress, there is always something to be thankful for. This Sunday, give yourself a gratitude check. Count your blessings. Glorify God and thank Him for the gift of your life!





Did you know...that the ten men with the disease leprosy were very sad? When someone had a skin disease, it was assumed that it was contagious (which it often was), and were considered "unclean". That meant that the person with



leprosy would not be able to go to the Temple, they were not allowed to live near other healthy people, not even their families and friends, until they were cured. Two thousand years ago, there weren't many cures, so many of these lepers lived the rest of their lives alone. Can you imagine being told that you could no longer live with your family, never again eat meals or have fun, or even go to Church, unless by some miracle you were healed? This is why when Jesus healed the ten lepers in today's Gospel, they hurried off to show the Temple Priest that they were healed, and to receive permission to go home. However, one man from the disliked country of Samaria realized that this healing was a gift from God, and thanked God the Father and Jesus, for this miracle. So often we take for granted all the blessings that we have—our homes, good food, clean water, healthy family members. We need to remember to thank God daily.

Solid Waste accounts for 75% of the total cost of managing the town's trash and recyclables.


Since Weston does not have a community composting system, all food scraps from its Transfer Station go in the trash (solid waste container). This is not good since food waste can be turned into something useful and having it in the garbage stream affects our climate.

Here's an idea we have to solve this: Composting food scrap:

Local families have been collecting their uncooked fruit/vegetable scraps, crushed egg shells, coffee grounds and tea leaves in recycled 5 gallon buckets lined with BPI certified compostable bags since the summer, food scraps has been taken to a plot in the back of Weston Community Garden to compost. During the months November-February, the Weston Community Garden is closed and Fr Mark has agreed to allow us to place a 64 Gallon Toter at the southern end (nearest Route 20) of the St Julia's Church parking lot. For regular pickup we have contracted with "SaveThat Stuff Inc" a Boston firm that converts food waste into energy.
