



GRAND ANNUAL APPEAL

Our Parish needs your help and financial support. Our Catholic faith is largely lived on the local level of the parish community and your contributions provide our parish's only source of income. Saint Julia Parish strives to accomplish our ongoing mission of evangelization with sacramental ministries, faith formation, works of charity and service. This past year the parish has embraced some new outreach ventures and enhanced other existing ministries. We have teamed with Nuestros Pequenos Hermanos (NPH) to transform children's lives in Central and South America and the Caribbean so that they can become productive and selfsufficient members of their communities. We have continued to provide assistance to refugee families seeking legal asylum. Through the efforts of our Faith Formation team we purchased, packaged and delivered some 10,000 simple dried meals for the impoverished population of Burkino Faso, West Africa. Our commitment to the needy in our midst continues through our ministries at Bristol Lodge, Pine Street Inn and contributions to the work of the Saint Vincent de Paul Society and Food Pantry.

Our ministries, parish facilities and charitable outreach depend upon your generosity. The parish's ongoing expenses for maintenance, utilities, salaries, educational and evangelical endeavors are presently not being met by parish collections. We have had dig into very limited savings to pay our bills. Please help by generously supporting our Parish Grand Annual Appeal that begins this week. Our Budgeted Goal of \$300,000 can only be met if all parishioners participate in some way. We request prayerfully considering a contribution or pledge of \$750.00 with the hope that those who can give more will respond even more generously.

LIVE THE LITURGY

Persisting in prayer allows us to find the determination, strength, and conviction to continue on course even when presented with difficulties. If we are determined in our pursuit of God, we will eventually find God breaking through our darkness with the light of His presence, gifting us with contemplative sight so that we can see as He sees and love as He loves. It is only when we take on the person of Christ that we are able, with God's help, to touch the world's pain and loneliness.



Did you know...that when we pray, we pray to God the Father, through God the Son, with the help of God the Holy Spirit?

That's all of God who hear us, listens to our prayers, and answers our prayers. The hard part is that sometimes God doesn't answer our prayers the way we want God to. People still die, the Boss is still mean, the house is still falling apart, the weather is still horrible.

Jesus tells us to not stop praying, just because we don't like the answer, or because it seems like God isn't listening. God knows best—God knows what is best for everyone around us. God may know that the person we want to live would just be suffering in some manner, and the person would be much happier in heaven. God also knows how to take a sad moment and bring joy back into the person's life. God knows how to take a human's action that causes harm, and bring joy back into the lives of victims. We just need to trust that God is answering our prayers in the way that is best for everyone, not just for "me".

Sometimes God uses us to answer someone else's prayer—a prayer for help, or a prayer for friendship. We need to listen and be ready to obey whenever God uses us as an instrument to answer someone else's prayer. This is how we can show love for God and for neighbor. How well do you listen?
